Todd's Thoughts

During a recent sermon I introduced the Myth of Redemptive Violence. This story, that violence will save us, is so much a part of our everyday culture that it mostly goes without notice, like water to a fish. What stands out, by contrast, are those rare stories that promote nonviolence. My favorite of them all has to be the Academy Award winning film, *Gandhi!* It came out when I was 14 years old, and offered me such an alternative worldview that I can honestly say it changed my life.

Another version of this uncommon perspective was the 1972 to 1975 TV series, *Kung Fu*. On the outset, it would seem the story of a trained Shaolin monk making his way through the Old West would be all about violence. But, as it turns out, it is the story of simple man trying to remain peaceful in the most violent of circumstances. During the first episode, young Kwai Chang Caine, the story's protagonist, asks his teacher, "What is the best way to deal with force?"

Master Teh replies, "As we prize peace and quiet above victory, there is a simple and preferred method... Run away!"

Episode after episode, this life-loving priest, wanted for murder, who's hands and feet are considered lethal weapons, struggles to resist engaging in the violence taking place all around him.

"Weakness prevails over strength," Master Kan instructs him, "Gentleness conquers. Become the calm and restful breeze that tames the violent sea."

Likewise, his most beloved instructor, the insightful, though blind, Master Po, taught him that, "Vengeance is like a water vessel with a hole; it carries nothing but the promise of emptiness."

So young Kwai Chang Caine grows into the peaceful warrior who tells us, "The taking of a life does no one honor," and challenges those around him with, "You have the weakness to defend yourself with killing. Have you not the strength to forgive?"

I wish there were more than but a handful of these nonviolent alternative stories around. Yet, as Caine himself once said, "To go anywhere begins by taking a first step."

• Financial Update

The Management Team is committed to keeping you informed about the financial state of the church. For those interested, here's a quick summary:

As of December 31, 2011, 50% of the 2011-12 fiscal year is complete and we're a bit ahead on revenue, collecting 54% of our annual goal. We're also a bit behind on expenses, spending 47% of our total budgeted expenses for the year. This puts us in a comfortable position of being a bit ahead. ;-) It looks like quite a few people made pledge payments before the end of the tax year, and Community Marketplace revenue is coming in on schedule.

FYI: UUCS Treasurer, Marie Bjork, posts the complete Balance Sheet, Profit & Loss report and Special Funds Report in the church foyer. As well, a Treasurer's Report "snapshot" is posted each month on the church website.

Board Slivers

Your Board of Trustees has been busy reviewing and crafting new ends statements to fulfill our obligation as stipulated in the UUCS bylaws. The ends statements reside in the policy governance document which articulates governance of our church. These ends statements point to where are headed and serve as a means of evaluating the performance of the management team, including our minister. The board is tasked with crafting the vision of where we are headed, but it is up to the management team to choose the means of getting to those ends. This can be a tricky exercise in semantics but the final result should give guidance to the minister and all church departments, without micromanaging. These ends statements should also resonate with our UU values.

We are currently considering ends statements covering the following topics: social justice, diversity, sense of community, sustainability/stewardship, environment, outreach, welcoming community and worship/religious exploration. Four board teams have tackled two topics apiece and at the February meeting (February 22nd) we will wrap up our discussion of these proposed ends statements. We have had access to congregational surveys and continue to solicit comments from the congregation as we navigate this process. If you see a board member (look for the red ribbons on our name tags) in the Fellowship Hall after a service, we welcome all comments about where you think our church should be headed. Or if you would prefer, you may send an email to boardoftrustees@uuspokane.org.

Once the ends statements have been successfully written and approved by the board they will become part of the policy governance document that governs the church. It is imperative that we complete this task as soon as possible as the management team needs the ends statements to plan their activities. The ends statements will also influence the budget process which begins in February for the following budget year (July 2012-June 2013). So, once again, we encourage any and all interested parties to talk to your board members so that we may fulfill our covenant with you. — Submitted by Rob Roose, UUCS Board of Trustees member

Come one, come all, as a vendor or a shopper, to the UUCS \$tUUff Sale! This sale is being held to allow many UUCS members, and others who are exploring Voluntary Simplicity through workshops and Simplicity Circles, to begin to downsize their material possessions and to live more lightly on the earth.

The \$tUUff Sale will be held on Saturday, March 31, 2012 from 9:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m. in the UUCS Sanctuary and Fellowship Hall. Set-up for participants will be encouraged and available on Friday, March 30th from 6:00 – 9:00 p.m.

Due to the limited space of our sanctuary and fellowship hall, we are starting small with this event. A maximum of 20 vendor spaces will be available for this sale. Eleven, 6' round tables, providing an 8'x8' selling space will be provided to participants at a cost of \$10. Table top and under the table space may be used for sale items for the round tables. Nine 10'x10' selling spaces will also be available, with one 2.5' x 8' rectangular table provided, at a cost of \$15.00 for the space. Participants may provide their own additional tables within this 10'x10' space for display. There will not be space provided to hang clothes, though clothes may be displayed on hangers hung from the edge of the tables or folded on top. Hand-made craft items may be included for sale within the space allotted, along with personal and household items.

Additional space will be set aside to accommodate larger items that would be cumbersome in allotted selling space. Signs will be placed on each item directing buyers to the table of the seller. Items larger than what one person can handle/transport alone are discouraged.

All participants will be asked to display during the posted hours of the sale and early take-downs are discouraged



(unless you sell everything!) All merchandise brought in to the church for sale MUST be removed at the end of the sale. Trucks from several non-profit organizations will be in the church parking lot beginning at 2:00 after the sale where participants may donate household items that they choose not to take back home.

Spokane Alliance Group

- **Alliance Supports Public Works Stimulus Bill**

The Spokane Alliance — which includes our church — is supporting a public works stimulus package of over \$1 billion that could bring 25,000 new jobs to Washington State by this summer.

Olympia legislators are discussing the proposal, dubbed the Washington State Infrastructure Jobs Bond Bill. It calls for selling revenue bonds for community, school, storm water, sewer and other projects — and paying for them out of a portion of the revenues received from taxes on hazardous materials and public works projects. Sponsors say the measure would not raise taxes and would bring needed jobs in the general trades.

So far, the proposal has been discussed among capital-budget leaders of both parties. Advocates include the Associated General Contractors, the Washington State Labor Council and the Washington State Building and Trades Council.

The public works stimulus plan could help Spokane with a variety of projects, including further home-weatherization and a high-priority civic goal: construction of a medical school.

Spokane Alliance members traveled to Olympia on Jan. 25 to lobby for the bill and are also organizing phone-banking sessions. If you're interested in phone-banking or simply want more information, called the Alliance office at 532 1688 or use e-mail: info@spokanealliance.org.

"Count to 10!" we were told...but then what? We've grown up hearing the admonition to STOP when we find ourselves poised to react in anger. (Wait — was that 10 seconds... 10 minutes or hours seems more reasonable.) I used to think the idea was to suppress that anger. I see it differently now, having come to recognize the value of anger in waking me up to what is most vital for me. With those 10 units of time I would now rather become curious about my own response — and then move from a place of deep, clear connection with my own essential values. Firmly grounded there, I hope I am more able to become curious and open to whoever has stimulated my anger, responding heart-to-heart, courageously and fully expressing (not suppressing!) what is true for me, more able to hear what is vital to them, beneath stories and judgments. Moving towards 10 seconds...
